

73rd Annual Scout – Guide Parade "It's Easy to be Green"



Commissioner's Corner

We all agree that Scouting offers a tremendous program for our youth. And we all try to offer the best program that we can, while keeping the cost to parents reasonable. But what is the monetary value of Scouting?

The average section meets for about 1 ½ hours per week, 35 weeks of the year. The average section also goes to camp 4 times per year, with about 24 hours of program time during each camp (not including the time that the youth are supposed to be sleeping). As a minimum, a youth member who attends most meetings and camps will enjoy at least 140 hours of Scouting each year. Many sections offer considerably more program hours than that. If we add in the hikes, the special events, the parade, the late nights at camp when the youth just won't go to sleep the total of waking hours that each youth is supervised might reach 175 to 200 hours per year.

What is a quality, value based program designed to encourage youth to improve their lives mentally, physically and socially worth per hour to parents? When asked, your group commissioners agreed that \$3 to \$5 per program hour would not be unreasonable. When compared to sports, or instructional activities or camps where

there is paid staff, \$3 to \$5 per hour would be a bargain!

The registration rates for our next Scouting season have been announced. Youth registering for Scouting in 2011/2012 with a reasonably active program will have a fee of about \$1 per program hour. That is an incredible value!

When talking to parents about our next Scouting season, don't reluctantly admit that our fees are \$175 for the year. Emphasize the value they are receiving. For only \$175, parents can be sure that their child will receive a fun filled and exciting program for 175 hours or more. Emphasize that the additional costs for camp are for food costs, supplies and expenses directly associated with the camp.

There has also been an announcement regarding the fees for volunteers for next season. All volunteers registered for the 2011/2012 Scouting season before August 31, 2011 will be \$0, as compared to \$80 last year. What this means is there will no longer be a need for additional registration fees for youth. None of the funds raised by your group will have to be used to pay for leadership registration. This will be a tremendous benefit to all groups and I encourage you to start recruiting and registering your volunteers now. Your

Group Commissioner will have an advance registration package soon.

As we have done in the past, all Deputy Area and Group Commissioner roles are open for appointment. If you are interested in making a difference to Scouting in a new role, please send me an email outlining the role you would like to apply for and briefly outline your qualifications. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Val Miller for serving as Deputy Area Commissioner for Troop Service. Val has decided to step down from the role after many years.

2011 also marks our 73rd Scout-Guide parade, our 55th Victoria Day Weekend Camporee, our 64th year of Mt. Nemo Scout Camp, the 34th year of the Beaver Chopperee, the 33rd year of Cub Fun Day, the 28th year of Klondike Camp and there have been over 1 million camper days at Mt. Nemo Scout Camp and over 2,000 Hamilton Scouts, Venturers & Rovers have attended Canadian and World Scout Jamborees.

EARLY RECOGNITION

Everyone likes to receive a thank you. It is important that we take every opportunity to thank fellow Scouters for their efforts. I would like to especially encourage you to thank those who are new to Scouting. A thank you can sometimes go a long way to encouraging these valuable people to commit for an additional year of service. The thank you can be as simple as a card signed by the youth and adults of the Group or maybe a big cake with candles. Anyone can submit a recommendation to the 'Recognition Committee' for consideration for a formal Scouts Canada Award. If you have someone in your Group or Area, whom you feel deserves to be recognized please consider preparing the nomination yourself. The most important part of the process at this point is the 'Scouters Career Check List'. If you are completing an SCC for someone else, we ask that in the 'Header' portion of the SCC, you indicate "Prepared by *your name* ." The second part of the process is the actual

'Nomination Form' available on the national web site. As part of this application, you are required, to include a narrative of what makes this service special or outstanding. If you are not comfortable with writing the narrative, simple put the information in point form, with a short explanation as to what is special and a member of the committee will complete the form for submission to the Battlefields Recognition Commissioner.

If you are going to prepare a nomination, you MUST contact Bruce Riddiough (905-549-3453) and advise him of your intention. This is to allow the committee to maximize resources and avoid duplication of effort.

If you know the person, this process is not as daunting as you may think. It does take some effort but your reward will be in seeing the shocked look on the persons face, when they are called forward to be thanked for their dedication to the World Wide Brother of Scouting.
